Department of Linguistics Title: Universal Constraints on Relationally Complex Clauses Below is a clarification submitted by Ronald Langacker, in response to S. -Y. Kuroda's paper, *Where is Chomsky's Bottleneck?*, which appeared in vol. 1, number 7 (September 1987) of this newsletter. The latter is a response to Langacker's paper, *The Cognitive Perspective*, featured in vol. 1, number 3 (February 1987).

In his oft-printed paper 'Where is Chomsky's Bottleneck?', Prof. Kuroda cites my previous remark (in 'The Cognitive Perspective') that the generative tradition presupposes the von Neumann architecture. Kuroda elevates this observation to the status of a technical claim, but that was certainly not my intent. Since I am no doubt at fault for making a statement that could lend itself to such misinterpretation, let me offer the following clarification: I was merely suggesting that the generative tradition is "inspired by" the von Neumann architecture in much the same sense that connectionism is said to be "neurally inspired", i.e. the role of the von Neumann-style digital computer in the one case, and of the brain in the other, is that of a guiding metaphor. One may agree or disagree with this assessment, but in any event 'Chomsky's bottleneck' is Kuroda's invention, not mine.
